

Ezhi-ineweyang miinaawa Anishinaabemoyang

The way we sound and convey Anishinaabe meaning

Languages are made of phonemes and morphemes. Phonemes are sounds and morphemes are combinations of sounds that make meaning. Sometimes when we are learning Anishinaabemowin we make the sounds but we don't know the meaning and other times we know the meaning but we can't make the sounds. As you start learning Anishinaabemowin, recognizing morphemes can help you understand and remember the words that you hear, even when you don't know the exact meaning (yet).

Note: Morphemes are a good starting point but like most language structures they are not *always* consistent and different speakers will have different perspectives.

- Inaajimo s/he tells a certain way
